1. The crocodiles and their close relatives the alligators and gharials are the sole survivors of the great group of reptiles, collectively known as crocodilians. Alligators and crocodiles look extremely alike. However, the main distinguishing feature is their teeth. In a crocodile, the teeth in the upper and lower jaws are in line, but in an alligator, the upper teeth lie outside the lower jaw when its mouth is shut. In both the animals, the fourth lower tooth on each side is larger than the rest. The alligator's head is broader and shorter and even the snout is comparatively blunter than that of a crocodile. Moreover, alligators are more sluggish than crocodiles and they spend most of their time basking on river banks. Alligators are not found in India. Of the two species, one is found in North America and the other in China. The Chinese alligator, found only in the Yangtse River basin, averages a little over four feet in length and has no webs between the toes. The American alligator on the other hand, is much larger with a maximum recorded length of 19 feet. An alligator's food changes with age. They feed on insects and crustaceans. As they grow they start eating frogs, snakes and fishes. Female alligator plays the more active role in courtship and in territorial defence. They lay about 15-80 hard-shelled eggs at a time. Baby alligators are just about eight inches long. They attain maturity at 6 years.



2. A crocodile is popularly known as the king of the water. It is distributed in warmer parts of the world, in Asia, Africa, Australia and America. There are three kinds of crocodiles which occur commonly in India. These are freshwater marsh crocodile or mugger, the salt water or estuarine crocodile and the gharial or slender-snouted crocodile. The mugger has a short snout whereas the gharial has a characteristically long and narrow snout. When inside water, crocodiles float very low with little more than the eyes and nostrils showing. They habitually carry several pounds of stones in their stomach which help in crushing the hard bones of the prey. The salt water crocodiles are known as the kings of crocodiles as they are the largest reptiles on earth. Of all the reptiles, the crocodiles prove to be the best parents. Crocodiles lay about 50–80 eggs. Males often share nest-guarding duties with the females. Being the master predators and scavengers, crocodiles keep the water system clean.

As they grow they start eating frogs, snakes and fishes. Female alligator plays the more active role in courtship and in territorial defence. They lay about 15-80 hard-shelled eggs at a time. Baby alligators are just about eight inches long. They attain maturity at 6 years.



2. A crocodile is popularly known as the king of the water. It is distributed in warmer parts of the world, in Asia, Africa, Australia and America. There are three kinds of crocodiles which occur commonly in India. These are freshwater marsh crocodile or mugger, the salt water or estuarine crocodile and the gharial or slender-snouted crocodile.
